

# 2021 Cordilleran Section 117<sup>th</sup> Meeting Report

After a disappointing cancellation of the 2020 Pasadena Section meeting, the 2021 Cordilleran Section meeting was a hugely successful meeting in May. This meeting was scheduled to be held in Reno, NV, but due to health and safety risks associated with COVID, it was entirely virtual. Organized by University of Nevada, Reno (UNR), meeting participation was strong, with numerous student opportunities.

In addition to excellent science presentations, the 2021 meeting resulted in approximately \$10,500 in net proceeds, which financially benefits all programs of the Cordilleran Section. # **Upcoming Field Forum**

2022 Thompson Field Forum: Old or Young? The topographic evolution of the Sierra Nevada, June 20-27 2022. Application deadline 2 February 2022.

We would like to bring to your attention this mobile meeting/workshop at the summer solstice in northern California. Controversy over the age of the elevation of the Sierra Nevada has repercussions for the application of paleoelevation approaches in many other mountain belts; it also pertains to the mechanism(s) that have produced this mountain

range, including the proposed foundering of lithosphere. We seek a broad range of views and disciplines to help explore these controversies (we note the co-leaders of this field forum disagree on many points). Understanding the constraints and observations relevant to an elevation history involves contributions from diverse geoscience specialties ranging from geophysics to geomorphology, volcanology to low-temperature thermochronology, botany to isotope geochemistry and more. Field relations are the key to many interpretations and can only be evaluated on the outcrop. This seven-day excursion with about 40 attendees will examine many key field sites in the Sierra during the daytime and will also include evening discussions centered on topics less tied to specific outcrops.

GSA welcomes applications from low-income, underrepresented, first-generation, non-traditional, women, veterans, LGBTQ+, students with disabilities and others. We expect to subsidize most expenses (including travel to Reno) for junior scientists (students and recent PhDs). We encourage everyone to apply, and the conveners are dedicated to ensuring the field forum is financially accessible to all participants. Costs for other attendees will likely fall in the \$100-\$600 range.
